
Protect, Strengthen,

Foster Care and Adoption. When families aren't healthy enough to stay together and children need protection, Buckner Foster Care and Adoption provides safe, loving homes for vulnerable children. Through counseling and additional resources, families and children are fully supported.



Buckner Family Hope Center®. The best place for a child to grow up is in a strong family. Through a mix of programs such as parenting classes, financial training, after-school opportunities, and family coaching at each Family Hope Center, families are strengthened and become self-sufficient. Every Family Hope Center is tailored to meet the unique needs of the community where it is located.



Buckner Family Pathways®. Single parents receive support and access to safe housing for their families while pursuing their education. Family Pathways offers a place where single parents and their children discover the independence, strength and empowerment to transform the course of their future for generations to come.



Buckner Retirement Services. We continuously enrich the lives of the aging population and meet their needs in Buckner senior living communities with a continuum of care, ranging from independent and assisted living to skilled nursing, and memory care.



Protect children

 **D**espite continuing COVID-19 safety protocols in Texas, the Dominican Republic, Guatemala, Honduras, Kenya, Mexico, and Peru, Buckner continued to protect children, offering programs to keep them safe and providing children loving families for a moment or forever.

HEADLINES

- ◆ Buckner Children and Family Services observed **50 years of protecting children in the Rio Grande Valley** with a celebration Nov. 2 in Mission, Texas.
- ◆ Buckner Foster Care and Adoption provided safe homes for Children Without Placement, addressing the state foster care capacity crisis. Locations housing the children and youth are Beaumont, Dallas, Lubbock, Midland and Mission. **A total of 192 were served in 2021.** The service was made possible through the generosity of donors, including one gift of \$438,000.
- ◆ Buckner marked its **25th year providing international ministry**, which has grown to include Buckner non-governmental organizations in six countries. That international reach also catapulted other ministries, including **Buckner Shoes for Orphan Souls®**, which has **collected more than 4 million** new shoes, and created the need for the 45,000-square-foot Buckner Center for Humanitarian Aid.
- ◆ Buckner Kenya participated in drafting the **2021 Amendment of Children Bill introduced in the Kenyan Parliament.** The amendment was submitted and accepted by the parliamentary committee. Also, Buckner Kenya Adoption Services signed an MOU with Yatima Orphan Outreach last year to provide legal aid grants for families seeking adoption. **About 35 families were projected to begin the legal adoption process.**
- ◆ The Center for Humanitarian Aid, alongside the Department of Health and Human Services, Catholic Charities, and Trusted World **provided 2.2 tons of aid for unaccompanied minors** staying at the Kay Bailey Hutchison Convention Center in Dallas.
- ◆ **Missouri Rotary District 6040 celebrated 20 years of collecting shoes** for Buckner Shoes for Orphan Souls®. The group held a shoe collection tour that made a stop at 15 locations – representing all 56 clubs in the district – to collect shoes. The club collected enough shoes to take their 20-year total to 371,000 pairs of shoes.

Protected

686 children were protected and cared for through Buckner foster families in Texas.

81 Texas children were adopted into loving families.

412 children were protected through Buckner permanency programs internationally, including:

39 children were adopted through Buckner Kenya.

373 children were provided foster, kinship, transitional home or other types of care (Kenya, Guatemala, Peru).


285 children lived safely with their mother or father at a Buckner Family Pathways® location in Texas.

673 Texas youth were helped with skills designed to transition them from care to successful adulthood through Transitional Case Management programs.



Parents' love. Faith and Gerald Varlack of Mission, Texas, became Buckner foster parents as a ministry to children. But the biological parents of three adult children took the next step, adopting sons Zane in June 2021, and Moses in November. The couple, both educators, are also artists and musicians active in their church's music ministry. Gerald described their fostering journey as, "God was giving us this opportunity, and we looked at it as a ministry with caring and compassion ..."





A place of her own. When Maria Pena (pictured with her son, Leo) was widowed almost three years ago, she was lost, insecure and not sure where to turn until she took a chance and opened the door to the nearby Buckner Family Hope Center® in Peñitas, Texas. Through the “Business Incubator” program at the Family Hope Center, Maria started a catering business and has successfully built a sustainable income for her family. But her success story doesn’t end there. In 2021, Cottonwood Creek Church in Allen, Texas, with a little help from First Baptist Church in Lufkin, worked with Buckner Missions to build Maria a new home.

Strengthen families

▶▶▶ **W**hen we strengthen families, we help parents develop the skills and sustainability to support their children, while at the same time we give their children valuable skills to be an integral part of a strong family.

HEADLINES

- ◆ **Buckner Peru's new clean water small business received its accreditation** by passing all inspections and water quality control tests to begin operation. The NGO also celebrated the National Day of the Peruvian Family in September and launched a month-long campaign highlighting the need for strong families.
- ◆ **The Project HOPES program was awarded Blue-Ribbon status** and will be recognized at the 2022 Parents as Teachers National Conference. In 2021, the Buckner Longview Project HOPES team earned a prestigious endorsement from Parents as Teachers National Center as a Blue-Ribbon Affiliate, making it one of the top performing home-visiting affiliates in the network.
- ◆ Buckner responded to Winter Storm Uri in February with aid and assistance in several locations, including:
 - **Dallas.** *The Buckner Family Hope Center® at Bachman Lake served as a warming station for area residents. In partnership with Park Cities Baptist Church, 400 hot meals, milk, water and blankets were also provided to families in need. Bachman Lake also joined with the City of Dallas to distribute water to residents lacking running water after the storm. More than 1,600 families were served.*
 - **West Dallas.** *The Buckner Family Hope Center® at Texas Rangers MLB Youth Academy provided emergency assistance during the winter storm to seniors who were without power or water.*
 - **Houston.** *The Buckner Family Hope Center® at Reed Road distributed water and sports drinks to more than 400 families.*
- ◆ In the **Dominican Republic**, the Buckner Manos Esforzadas economic strengthening project began negotiations with Feed My Starving Children to significantly increase sales of its products to **provide more work and revenue for Family Hope Center clients.**
- ◆ In **Peru**, the **Bio-Garden project funded by the World Hunger Fund Offering was started** with 17 families of 50 that will participate in this project. The project will provide fresh fruit and vegetables for family consumption.
- ◆ The Buckner Honduras new NGO **received final approval to legally operate as Buckner Honduras** from the Honduran government.

Strengthened

40,610 family members were strengthened through the Buckner Family Hope Center® model.

16,276 family members were strengthened in the 11 Family Hope Centers in the Dominican Republic, Guatemala, Honduras, Kenya, Mexico, and Peru.

23,407 family members were strengthened in nine Texas Family Hope Centers.

2,208 family members

were strengthened through Buckner FAYS initiatives to reduce family conflict, help with family support and skills, and prevent the problems of runaways, school attendance issues and delinquent behaviors.

1,215 people

went through Buckner-led Universal Child Abuse Prevention (UCAP) programs.

42,302 family members in need received client assistance and humanitarian aid.

2,981 received aid domestically.

39,321 received aid internationally.

903 family members'

lives were enriched through Project HOPES, or Healthy Outcomes through Prevention and Early Support, which supports parents and promotes healthy families through encouragement and education.

Transform generations

 **B**reaking the cycle of family struggles through ministries that solve problems at their root helps families transform from generation to generation.

HEADLINES

- ◆ **Buckner Kenya provided financial aid to 250 families** unable to afford high school tuition due to the pandemic. The aid was made possible by a Buckner donor.
- ◆ The **Family Hope Center in Longview** completed a **virtual Bible study for clients** called “Dream of You,” offered in both English and Spanish.
- ◆ **In Peru, 38 men participated in a spiritual transformation retreat** with a local chaplain to focus on healthy relationships with their children.
- ◆ Six **Buckner Family Pathways® mothers in Midland successfully completed** “Suits with Skills,” an empowerment program provided by the Junior League of Midland. Two residents graduated from the Family Pathways program in May.
- ◆ **Since initiating weekly COVID-19 screening protocols, Camp Buckner remained open** and serving guests, including Buckner foster care families and Family Pathways families.

Transformed

156 single mothers

and single fathers had a safe place for their children at one of the eight Buckner Family Pathways® locations in Texas.

130 fathers


participated in the Fatherhood EFFECT (Educating Fathers For Empowering Children Tomorrow) program, which provides parent education and resources to fathers of children birth to age 17.

7,835 family members, youth and children, organizations and churches made memories to last for generations at Camp Buckner, which reopened in 2021 with modified COVID-19 safety protocols.





Generational change. Brooklyn Cole's life trajectory and that of her son were forever changed by the impact of the Buckner Family Pathways® program in Midland. But her story of transformed generations didn't end there. On Nov. 5, 2021, National Adoption Day, Brooklyn adopted her younger brother Anthony, offering her own version – and vision – of the power to transform generations.



Serve seniors

 **W**e're Inspiring happiness® for senior adults by serving their needs in Buckner senior living communities, enriching their lives with the dignity, energy and attention they deserve.

HEADLINES

◆ **Award-winning service.** Buckner Retirement Services received four LeadingAge Texas Awards in 2021, including:

- **Buckner Retirement Services, Inc.**, was honored by LeadingAge with the Public Trust Award for its work in communicating to residents and families during the pandemic. BRS President Charlie Wilson responded to the award, saying, "It's critical that we communicate the right things and things that we know we can deliver upon, so there's no greater honor than having your peers recognize the work that you've done. We're very fortunate to have an organization that's built on transparency and trust in all of our communication."
- **Cheryl Johnson**, director of health services, **was selected as the 2021 Dr. Herbert Shore Outstanding Mentor award winner.** The award recognizes an individual who has demonstrated outstanding abilities in one-on-one teaching and motivating while challenging and developing future leaders in the field of aging services.
- **Buckner Parkway Place** in Houston was **selected for the 2021 Excellence in the Workplace Award**, which recognizes organizations that demonstrate effectiveness in fostering and advancing a healthy workplace culture and an environment that promotes the recruitment, retention and development of staff at all levels of the organization.



- **John Bender**, chaplain at Parkway Place, **was selected for the 2021 Service Excellence Award**, which honors those individuals in direct service who demonstrate extraordinary talent, expertise and dedication in provision of exceptional service to residents.

- ◆ **Buckner Westminster Place** celebrated its **25th anniversary** in June. Residents, families and grandchildren came together to celebrate the anniversary with a fish fry and fishing tournament. Participants also opened a time capsule buried at the Buckner senior living community in Longview.
- ◆ **Buckner Parkway Place in Houston received assistance** during Winter Storm Uri **from local churches.** With historic low temperatures sweeping throughout the state of Texas, many cities, including Houston, struggled with power outages and water shortages. Two churches in Houston wanted to ensure the senior adults at Parkway Place were provided for. **Tallowood Baptist Church** delivered 115 cases of water to the senior living community, and **Gateway Church Houston** also brought 100 blankets to give to the seniors at Parkway Place.


Moved by you





Buckner International and Subsidiaries Statement of Activities


