## What is therapeutic care?

Buckner Foster Care and Adoption is licensed for two levels of therapeutic foster care: Moderate and Specialized.



**Moderate and Specialized Therapeutic Care** involves caring for children who may have one or more of the following needs:

- Nondebilitating medical conditions
- Behaviors or conditions requiring regular therapy appointments
- Increased level of supervision
- Behavior intervention solutions

Buckner provides additional support and resources to therapeutic foster care families.

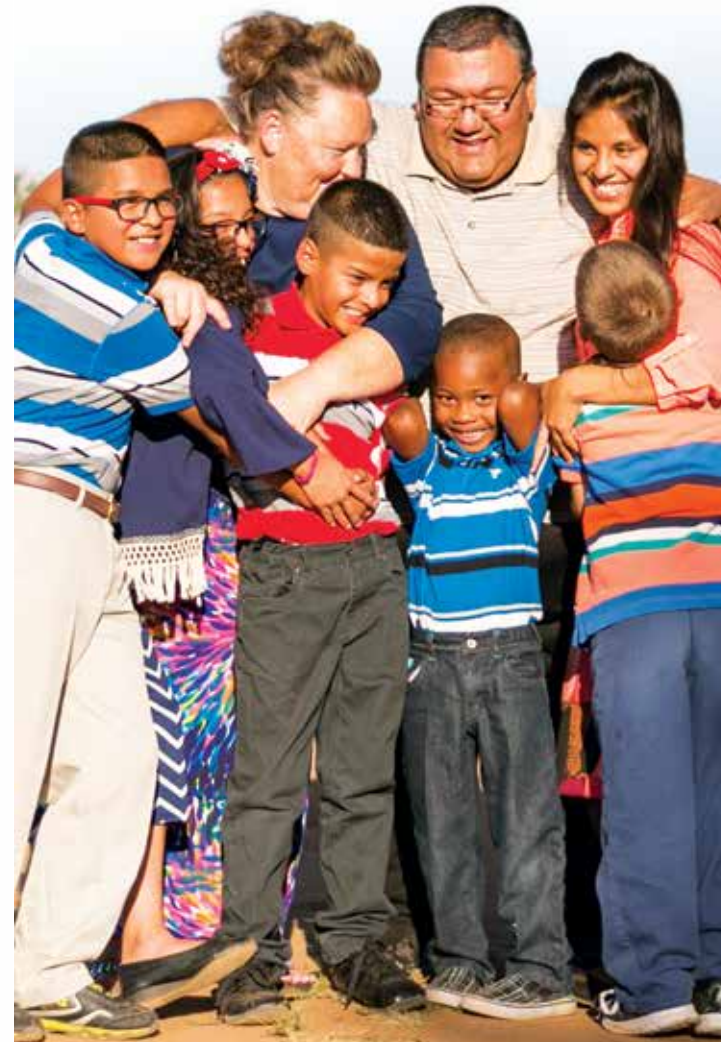

# What are the biggest needs in foster care and adoption in Texas?

## CARE OF OLDER CHILDREN AND TEENS

- In Texas, more than 1,000 kids age out of foster care each year.\*
- There are more than 9,000 kids age 12 and older in foster care in Texas.\*



## CARE OF SIBLING GROUPS

- 7,253 sibling groups in the state of Texas are currently in foster care.\*
- 35% of siblings are separated while in foster care.\*



# Michael and Candy Palmer followed the call to **keep siblings together.**

**T**here are more than 7,000 sibling groups in the state of Texas alone who are currently in the foster care system, according to the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services. Of those, 34.9% are not placed together. Caylin Palmer shares how her and her siblings lost hope in ever being adopted together after they'd been in foster care for about five years.

*"We all made a pact that we wouldn't get adopted if we weren't all together. I had lost all hope of being adopted. So, we just thought we'd age out of the system together. The fact that we were*

*all adopted together was just incredible."*

*"I think keeping siblings together, it probably helps them have some normalcy, because you think they have been moved around from home to home and who knows if they got to stay together in foster care. But being able to stay together as a family, I think it was really important to our*

So, we've given them a future and something to look forward to. They have something to come home to, holidays, birthdays, those kinds of things.
